Switches commonly use optical ports such as SFP, SFP+, SFP28, QSFP+, and QSFP28 for fiber connections, supporting speeds from 1G to 100G and beyond.

Common Optical Port Types

- **SFP (Small Form-factor Pluggable):** Supports 1 Gbps connections and can accommodate both fiber optic and copper transceivers. It is widely used for uplinks or connecting switches over longer distances using fiber .
- **SFP+ (Enhanced SFP):** Supports speeds up to 10 Gbps. SFP+ ports are backward compatible with SFP modules at 1 Gbps but cannot accept SFP+ modules in standard SFP ports .
- **SFP28:** Designed for 25 Gbps data transmission while maintaining the same compact form factor as SFP/SFP+ .
- **QSFP/QSFP+ (Quad SFP):** Supports 40 Gbps (QSFP+) and 100 Gbps (QSFP28) connections, commonly used in high-density data center environments for spine-leaf or aggregation links .

Interface Types and Modules

Optical ports typically use LC, SC, or MPO connectors depending on the transceiver and fiber type (single-mode or multi-mode). These ports require compatible optical modules to convert electrical signals to optical signals for transmission over fiber .
